#### Want To Trace Your Family Tree?

Worcestershire Archive and Archaeology Service have been providing excellent family history resources for over 75 years. Begin your family history trail with us.





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#### What's First?

- Read through some of the magazines and publications written about Family History that can be found at The Hive or ask the staff.
- Can you use a computer? Many records that you need to look at are available online.
- Decide which line of the family you want to trace.
- Ask the family Who married who? Where did they marry? Did they have any children? Have they got any old birth, marriage or death certificates or photos of your ancestors?
- Check everything you have found for useful information and decide how you want to store it.

You're now ready to start researching using some basic records!





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#### **Civil Registration**

This was introduced in 1837 when all births, marriages and deaths had to be registered. However, the registration of births was not enforced until 1875.

To obtain copies of certificates it would be helpful to know the person's name, the approximate date of the event and the district where the event took place. You can then look though indexes of names to find the date of the event. Indexes can be found online (<u>www.freebmd.org.uk</u>) or, for dates between 1837 and 2004, on microfilm here in The Hive.

Certificates cannot be viewed online – they must be ordered from the local registrar, or from the General Register Office (<u>https://www.gov.uk/research-family-history</u>). They provide information such as dates, parents, and address.

#### **Parish Registers**

Parish registers provide lists of baptisms, marriages, and burials which occurred within the boundaries of an ecclesiastical or civil parish. We hold copies of these on microfilm here at The Hive.

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Entries can provide such information as immediate relatives, age, address, or even profession. Even if entries often do not provide precise dates of birth or dates of death, it can usually be assumed that an entry is close in proximity to those events.

Copies of parish registers were kept centrally by the diocese. These are known as Bishop's Transcripts. They often provide the same information but can be used to clarify details if you suspect that a register entry was missed, damaged, destroyed, or illegible. Digital copies of our Bishop's Transcripts are available on Ancestry.

Please note that parish registers only recorded information relating to Anglican persons, and often related to churches under the Church of England.

We do hold some similar records relating to Catholic, Non-Conformist, and other Christian churches and organisations, or these can be located through respective administrative structures.

Family history resources for other faiths and faith-based organisations are often retained locally within places of worship and communities.





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#### Census

In the UK, population censuses have been taken every 10 years since 1801. However, names of individuals can only be found from 1841 onwards. Census records are released to the public 100 years from the date on which they occurred. Publicly available censuses currently range from 1841-1921. Census returns are government records, and so the originals are held at The National Archives, in Kew. Statistical data can be obtained from the Office for National Statistics.

We hold copies of Worcestershire census returns from 1841-1901 on microfilm, but the most convenient way to access this information is via online services such as Ancestry or Findmypast. These services can be accessed for free at any Worcestershire County Library, including The Hive.

The most recent census released was the 1921 census. We do **not** currently provide access to this census and is currently only available to access online through Findmypast. The originals can be consulted for free at The National Archives.

The 1931 census was destroyed in a fire, and the 1941 census didn't occur due to the Second World War. The next UK census won't be released until 2052. The





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
1939 national register acts as a stand-in for census information and can be

accessed in a digital format via Findmypast or Ancestry.

#### Wills and Probate Records

These records can reveal information about family members and their relationship to the deceased. They can often include such records as inventories of property, particularly for probate records in the 16th-18th centuries.

Worcestershire wills from 1451- 1928 are held at The Hive on microfilm, and our indexes are



sorted by surname. The National Probate Index is found on microfiche and covers wills proved between 1858 -1943.





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#### **Trade Directories**

Trade directories became popular in the 18th century. They list tradespeople, local businesses, or some private residents for cities, towns, and villages across Worcestershire. Not everyone would have been included in these publications,

but they can give a good description of a specific area, including information about schools, churches, and public buildings around at the time. We hold a collection of directories ranging from the 19<sup>th</sup> to 20<sup>th</sup> century in the Self-Service area of the archive, here in The Hive.







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#### **Other Useful Sources**

We have a huge range of records, including photographs, school records, hospital records, maps, plans, family, and estate papers, and we also hold diocesan archive for Worcestershire. You never know what could be useful to you.
