Recording, Information and Disposals Policy

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The Worcestershire Historic Environment Record is the primary index of all heritage assets and investigations for the County of Worcestershire. The HER covers all the land within the local districts of Wyre Forest, Bromsgrove, Redditch Borough, Wychavon and Malvern Hills, including the area of Malvern Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty located within the county boundaries.

Worcestershire HER does not cover the city of Worcester which is provided for by Worcester City HER, although the two HERs have a shared database and therefore joint accessibility for viewing data.

Mission Statement

Worcestershire Archive and Archaeology Service's (WAAS) priority is to ensure the proper management of Worcestershire's heritage for current and future generations. We protect, preserve, manage, record, interpret, share and promote the history and historic environment of Worcestershire. We help the modern county of Worcestershire to achieve its priorities as identified in the Corporate Plan, especially sustainable development, a strong economy, better education and skills and independent healthy living. We are developing a sustainable model for the continuance and growth of the Archive and Archaeology Service in the current financial climate.

Access & Information Services policy

Purpose of the HER

The aim of the HER is to provide access to Historic Environment resource for the County of Worcestershire, accessible by everyone. The record provides a starting point for research and investigations for both planning/ conservation commercial customers, and academic, private or local community research.

The HER database is the County of Worcestershire's primary resource for archaeological and historic environment information. We hold approximately 83,000 records including archaeological sites, historic buildings, monuments, and landscape features. The HER can help you to research:

- Your area, whether that's a village, a particular building, or parish
- A particular period of interest, including Roman, Medieval, and World War II
- Industries such as lime kilns, carpet factories, and needle manufacturing
- Historic artefacts, such as coins, pottery, plant, and animal remains

Users of the HER

The HER is operated by staff members of the HER & Advisory team within Worcestershire Archive and Archaeology Service. The HER is further utilised, through the provision of HER Search, Records and access to sources, to the following groups of users:

- County Council and District Council staff including planners, environmental specialists and land managers.
- Commercial archaeologists and heritage professionals
- Countryside managers and their agents
- Developers and their agents
- Academics and Students
- Local societies and groups including Local List and Neighbourhood Plan groups
- Museum staff including a Portable Antiquities Scheme/ Finds Liaison Officer
- Members of the public

User Consultation

The HER is committed to ensuring it provides the services required by its users and works to develop and widen the user-base. The HER welcomes informal feedback about record content and service provision. All HER enquiries are provided with a response evaluation sheet and enquiry logs are kept and reviewed to inform service development.

The HER also undertakes a full customer survey every 3 years of known users through targeted invitation where customers/ contractors have provided information for contact, and through open invitation publicised on social media and hard copy flyers.

The HER also undertakes opportunities to survey archive service users and library service users which includes university students, to inform on options for audience development through attraction of non-user groups.

Access to the HER

The HER was set up as a planning tool over 50 years ago and contained a minimum level of data. Since then the records have been added to and enhanced as more information has come to light. The records, therefore, vary greatly in their detail and accuracy. We are constantly updating and improving the records, however, they are compiled from a range of sources of varying quality and the information they contain should not be seen as definitive. We cannot accept responsibility for the accuracy of any information supplied and the user must accept that information may be outdated or inaccurate. The HER search results will remain valid for 3 months only from the date of production, because the HER is constantly being updated as new sites of archaeological importance are identified.

Governing Policy

The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) states that local planning authorities should maintain or have access to a historic environment record which contains upto-date evidence about the historic environment for use in assessing the significance and contribution of known heritage assets as well as judging the potential for the discovery of further sites or deposits of archaeological interest. The Worcestershire HER undertakes to provide this evidence base with coverage of all subjects and periods of archaeology from the Palaeolithic period through to the present day, as recommended in the following national policies;

The HER is not definitive and is subject to varying degrees of research and evidence across all periods, as well as geographically across the county. The Register of Recording Policy detailed in the table below demonstrates the types of data held within the HER and the policies utilised for data capture and recording. The Worcestershire HER Recording Manual (internal document) also governs data entry.

Access to information held at Worcestershire HER is regulated by the Freedom of Information (The Stationery Office 2000), the Data Protection Act (HMSO 1998) and The Environmental Information Regulation 2004 (The Stationery Office 2004).

Submission of information to the HER

Heritage assets range from sites and buildings of local historic value to those of the highest significance (NPPF). Worcestershire HER considers all buildings and built structures present on the 1st Edition Ordnance Survey (1882-87) that are still standing to be heritage assets. All pre-20th archaeological sites, historic places and landscapes are also considered heritage assets. Later buildings, sites, structures and landscapes may be considered heritage assets for their evidential, historic, aesthetic and/or communal value.

- Worcestershire has an ongoing project, started in 2009 and part-funded by Historic England, to add every extant building of pre 1900 date to the county HER.
- Traditional Farmsteads i.e. all those which predate 1940 are also identified as heritage assets, both in Worcestershire (<u>Worcestershire Farmstead Characterisation</u>) and nationally (https://historicengland.org.uk/research/current/discover-and-understand/rural-heritage/farmsteads-character/).
- Buildings and structures of 20th century date which make a positive contribution to our understanding and appreciation of an area or place, or key aspects of 20th century life, art, architecture and landscape may be considered heritage assets of local, or greater than local, significance. In 2020 further guidance on 20th century non-domestic buildings and public places in Worcestershire was published (<u>Adding a New Layer: 20th Century Heritage in Worcestershire</u>).

Structures associated with the 20th century militarised landscape of the
United Kingdom are also considered heritage assets. These are primarily the
defence works built in the period 1940-41 against threatened German
invasion, but also include any other identified military sites. Between 1995
and 2001 the Defence of Britain Project initiated a national effort to record
these structures and sites (<u>Defence of Britain Database</u>). This project was
followed by the Defence of Worcestershire project which continued the work
of recording local 20th century military heritage, the results of which have
been added to the HER.

The HER endeavours to create a comprehensive record of the county's heritage assets and welcomes the submission of academic and private research including public observations. These can be made through our online enquiry system or via email. Where possible, as much detail and evidence about the geographic location and nature of the heritage asset should be provided. Please note however that the HER is not itself an archive repository for primary site records deriving from excavations or surveys undertaken for commercial or research purposes, neither is it a museum for the deposition of artefacts. This material should be deposited in the relevant record office or museum to ensure its long-term conservation and access by all. (See the HER Disposals Policy for further details).

The results of all commercial archaeological work must be made available to historic environment colleagues and the general public through inclusion in the Worcestershire HER, as required within the Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Projects in Worcestershire (2019). Reports must be provided to the HER in PDF/A format via OASIS (Online Access to the Index of Archaeological Investigations https://oasis.ac.uk/).

Copyright, GDPR & Confidentiality

The copyright holder for the majority of sources within the HER is usually a third party, not the HER. In these instances, the onus is on the customer to obtain permission for reproduction from the relevant person(s). The HER accepts no responsibility for any user making unauthorized copies of such documents. Many of the sources used within the HER are 'grey literature' reports, produced through the modern planning and development process. All reports that are produced via the development control process are considered to be within the public domain. However, copyright restrictions (particularly with regard to Ordnance Survey mapping) or the inclusion of confidential or commercially sensitive information means that not all reports can be made freely available over the internet. Other reports have been excluded by request of the copyright holder. The metadata for reports that cannot be accessed online are recorded within the HER, but customers must visit the HER to access the reports.

Where a data provider has requested a record to be confidential, or a record contains sensitive information for example details of a Hoard site, the record will be marked confidential within the HER and details will only be provided for use within development management.

Further details on established copyright agreements and licenses held by the Worcestershire HER can be found in the Copyright Agreements Schedule (internal document).

The entirety of the Historic Environment Record is classified as historical research, under Recital 156 of GDPR, and safeguards have been put in place to ensure data minimisation. GDPR Compliance training has been undertaken by all HER staff and will be renewed every 2 years. Worcestershire HER Disposals Policy

The HER does presently maintain a selected collection of reference material which consists of books, maps, photographs and other sources which are used on a day-to-day basis in the work of the HER. The HER endeavours to take any opportunity to digitise this collection but will retain the material until such time as its relevant content has been processed into the HER database and all paper and hard copy material has been appropriately archived.
